Access to Healthy Food:

Washington's Food Insecurity Nutrition Incentive (FINI) Program helps families access fruits and vegetables.

Increasing access to healthy food. The Washington State Department of Health and over 60 multi-sector partners won a four-year \$5.86 million *Food Insecurity Nutrition Incentives (FINI)* grant, awarded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). These funds will support innovative approaches to make it easier for participants in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP, formerly known as "food stamps" and called "Basic Food" in Washington) to afford more fruits and vegetables.

Our approach. Children and families need easy, convenient, and affordable access to healthy food. This is especially important for families on a limited budget. This grant will help by providing monetary incentives at the point-of-sale so SNAP shoppers can buy more fruits and vegetables. We will work in collaboration with state and local agencies, grocery stores, farmers markets, and health systems to provide the fruit and vegetable incentives.



Farmers Market SNAP Match Programs

Customers who use their SNAP benefits at farmers markets are matched with cash-value market tokens they can use to buy more fruits and vegetables. By 2019, FINI will support over 80 farmers markets offering SNAP match incentive programs.

Fruit and Vegetable Prescriptions

Community-based health providers will distribute Fruit and Vegetable Prescriptions (\$10 vouchers) to patients who participate in SNAP. Patients can "fill" their prescriptions at participating farmers markets and any Safeway store in Washington.

Grocery Store Discounts/Rebates

Customers who spend \$10 of their SNAP benefits on fruits and vegetables will receive a \$3 coupon to use off their next purchase of the same. Qualifying fruits and vegetables will include fresh, canned, or frozen with no added fats, sugars, or salt.

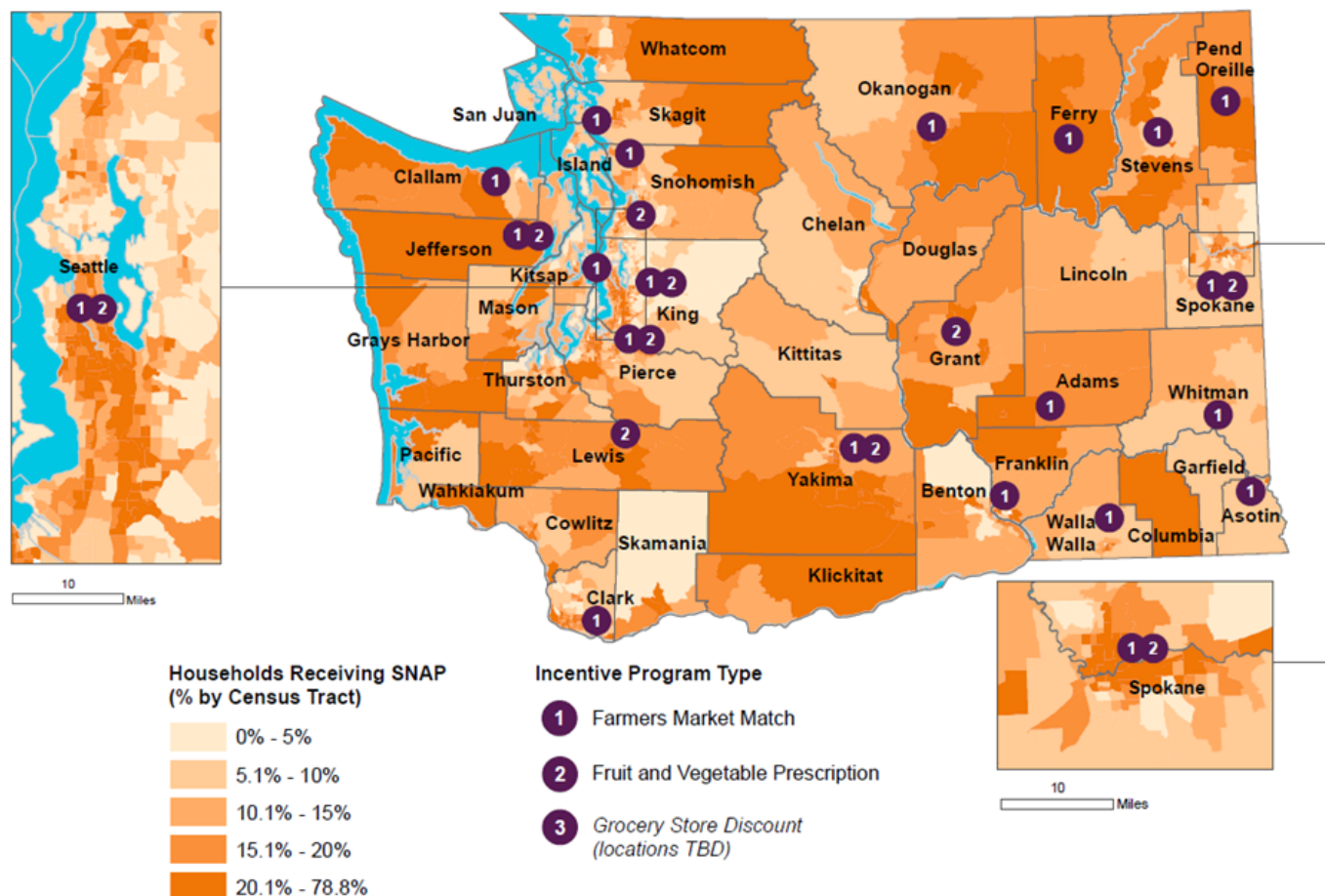
