SUBJECT: **COUNTY CHILDREN’S TRUST FUND (CCTF) SHARE OF KIDS’ PLATE REVENUE**

REASON FOR THIS TRANSMITTAL

This notice is to inform you that the California Department of Social Services (CDSS) will distribute the CCTF’s Kids’ Plates Program revenue allocated by the Budget Act of 2015. The total distribution for Fiscal Year (FY) 2015-16 is \$930,000. Each county’s share is based on the proportion of the county’s population of children less than 18 years of age compared to the total population of children in California, as reported by Department of Finance December 2015 statistics¹. The allocations for FY 2015-16 are shown on the enclosed chart (Attachment A).

Pursuant to California Welfare and Institutions Code (WIC) section 18967, the purpose of the CCTF is to fund child abuse and neglect prevention and intervention programs operated by private nonprofit organizations or public institutions of higher education with recognized expertise in fields related to child welfare. Under WIC section 18983, the CCTF monies are also used to fund Child Abuse Prevention Coordinating Councils. The intent of the Kids’ Plates Program revenue is to strengthen health and safety protections for children and to help fund programs to reduce child injury and child abuse.

The California Department of Motor Vehicles generates the Kids’ Plates Program revenue from initial and renewal fees for custom and sequential California “Have a Heart, Be a Star, Help Our Kids” vehicle license plates. Pursuant to California Vehicle Code section 5072, Kids’ Plates Program revenue is deposited into the Child Health and Safety Fund, created in the State Treasury pursuant to WIC section 18285. The WIC section 18285(e)(1) directs up to 25 percent of the monies to fund child abuse

prevention programs (22.5 percent to the County Children's Trust Fund and 2.5 percent to the State Children's Trust Fund). The remaining monies are to be used for licensing activities related to the Child Care Program of the Community Care Licensing Division within CDSS, and for childhood injury prevention programs and activities.

To facilitate your efforts to prevent child abuse and neglect and to promote early intervention, we encourage you to coordinate the use of the Kids' Plates Program revenue with other funding sources such as Child Abuse Prevention, Intervention and Treatment, Community-Based Child Abuse Prevention and Promoting Safe and Stable Families funds.
