SUBJECT: PANDEMIC INFLUENZA PLANNING ACTIVITIES

This is to provide information on pandemic influenza planning activities occurring at the State level and to focus attention on refugees to ensure that they are included in county planning activities.

California Department of Health Services (CDHS) Activity

According to the California CDHS, one of the most important public health issues facing California is the threat of pandemic influenza. California, with its multiple international ports of entry, may be one of the first states to be affected by a pandemic influenza outbreak.

A pandemic influenza strain does not currently exist. However, genetic changes to new strains of avian influenza could result in it being readily transmissible from person to person. The CDHS has prepared a Pandemic Influenza Preparedness and Response Plan (PIPRP), which focuses on detection, response and recovery. It is designed to follow the management and collaborative structure of the State's Standardized Emergency Management System. Emergency preparedness for pandemic influenza is one of the highest priorities for the State.

Federal Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) Requirement

On March 17, 2006, ORR State Letter #06-10 was issued, requiring the California Department of Social Services (CDSS) to submit an amendment to the California State Plan for Refugee/Entrant Assistance and Services to address pandemic influenza planning. The purpose of the State Plan amendment is to promote the continuity of the Refugee Program in the event of a pandemic influenza outbreak. The CDSS State Plan amendment, approved by ORR on August 23, 2006, committed the CDSS to send an All-County Information Notice providing information on pandemic influenza.

Although pandemic influenza would impact the entire State, refugees have two additional challenges if such an emergency should occur. The first is the existence of a potential language barrier. Because refugees often possess limited English proficiency and speak languages which may not be shared with a large percentage of the population, we are encouraging planners to consider how refugee populations can be included in planning activities and would be informed in emergencies. Secondly, the media channels used for informing the public may not be effective in reaching the refugee population. We encourage local planners and local refugee community-based organizations to work together to identify ethnic radio, newspaper, and television outlets to provide information.

Attached for information is a chart which shows Total Refugee Arrivals to California Counties by Country of Origin, for the period of October 1, 1994 through September 30, 2005.

Pandemic Influenza Information

The CDSS Refugee Programs Bureau (RPB), in collaboration with the CDHS Refugee Health Section, is working to promote awareness of pandemic influenza in the refugee community. Enclosed is a checklist that will provide action steps to lessen the impact of a pandemic influenza outbreak in the community. This is a helpful resource which contains practical information on planning for a pandemic disease and how to limit the spread of germs and prevent infection. The checklist is also available on the website managed by the federal Health and Human Services Department at www.pandemicflu.gov.

The CDSS encourages all of you to participate in local pandemic influenza planning activities to better prepare for an outbreak of pandemic influenza.

Pandemic Flu Planning

Checklist for Individuals & Families

You can prepare for an influenza pandemic now. You should know both the magnitude of what can happen during a pandemic outbreak and what actions you can take to help lessen the impact of an influenza pandemic on you and your family. This checklist will help you gather the information and resources you may need in case of a flu pandemic.

1. To plan for a pandemic:

- Store a two week supply of water and food. During a pandemic, if you cannot get to a store, or if stores are out of supplies, it will be important for you to have extra supplies on hand. This can be useful in other types of emergencies, such as power outages and disasters.
- Periodically check your regular prescription drugs to ensure a continuous supply in your home.
- Have nonprescription drugs and other health supplies on hand, including pain relievers, stomach remedies, cough and cold medicines, fluids with electrolytes, and vitamins.
- Talk with family members and loved ones about how they would be cared for if they got sick, or what will be needed to care for them in your home.
- Volunteer with local groups to prepare and assist with emergency response.
- Get involved in your community as it works to prepare for an influenza pandemic.

2. To limit the spread of germs and prevent infection:

- Teach your children to wash hands frequently with soap and water, and model the current behavior.
- Teach your children to cover coughs and sneezes with tissues, and be sure to model that behavior.
- Teach your children to stay away from others as much as possible if they are sick. Stay home from work and school if sick.
