



FY 2001/02 CalWORKs eligibility administration allocations can be used to fund positions to provide for the continuation of data acquisition activities necessary to comply with federal data reporting mandates, through the 18 Performance Sample Counties (excluding Los Angeles County). The cost and savings associated with approved premises that affect the administration of CalWORKs Eligibility are also included within this allocation. Attachment II provides information on the adjustments and Attachment V describes the individual premises.

Welfare-To-Work - Employment Services:

This allocation includes funding for employment services line staff and supervisors, administrators and clerical staff, overhead, and direct services delivery costs.

The costs and savings associated with approved premises that affect the CalWORKs Employment Services Basic costs are included within this allocation. Attachment III provides information on the adjustments and Attachment VI describes the individual premises.

Cal Learn:

Assembly Bill 2772 (Chapter 902, Statutes of 1998) changed the status of the Cal Learn Program from a five-year federal demonstration project to a permanent program. Effective April 1, 1999 sanctioned Cal Learn teen parents became ineligible for TANF funds and became State-only cases due to the expiration of the federal waiver under which Cal Learn was implemented.

The Case Management Caseload is calculated from data in the Monthly Status Report (STAT 45) for the June 2000, September 2000, December 2000 and March 2001 quarters using the total number of teen parents with Cal Learn status, less deferral for case management services unavailable. The allocation was adjusted on a percent to total basis to the funds included in the FY 2001/02 budget. The Transportation and Ancillary allocation distributes available dollars on a percent to total ratio of the Case Management Caseload.

Administrative Caseload is calculated from data in the Monthly Status Report (STAT 45) for the June 2000, September 2000, December 2000 and March 2001 quarters using the total number of teen parents with Cal Learn status, plus total number of teen parents who are exempt, less the number of teen parents who became exempt. Eligibility and Administrative Activities are based on each county's budgeted FY 2001/02 eligibility worker unit cost times 1 hour. The allocation was adjusted on a percent to total basis to the funds budgeted in the FY 2001/02 budget.

## CalWORKs Child Care:

The CalWORKs Child Care allocation consists of the following two elements: Stage One Child Care and Child Care Health and Safety Requirements.

### Stage One Child Care

Consistent with County Welfare Directors Association request, the Stage One Child Care funds were allocated by distributing 30 percent of the funds on a percent to total of the most recent state fiscal year quarters (June 2000 through March 2001). The remaining 70 percent of the funds were allocated by using each county's number of children on aid through the age of 12 (Source: Medi-Cal Eligibility Determination System (MEDS), (January 2000 through December 2000), times the cost per child in Child Care for that county (Source: County Expense Claim and Child Care Monthly Report – CW115, April 2000 through March 2001 quarters). Since the FY 2001/02 Child Care funds were reduced by 1.74 percent from FY 2000/01, each county's actual expenditures have been reduced by 1.74 percent. The counties were guaranteed not to receive less than their adjusted actual expenditures for the most recent quarters (June 2000 through March 2001 quarters). See Attachment IV.

For the Stage One Child Care allocation, the Child Care Monthly Report (CW115) for caseload and updated expenditures from the County Expense Claim were used to calculate the cost per child.

Child Care Reserve funds may be available to meet child care needs that exceed the counties' allocations. ### Child Care Health and Safety Requirements

Child Care Health and Safety Requirements contains two administrative cost funding components, Trustline and Self-Certification. The Trustline Registry uses applicant fingerprints to search the California Child Abuse Central Index and the California Criminal History System to determine if a potential license-exempt child care provider has any disqualifying California criminal convictions. Self-Certification pertains to license exempt child care providers who must self-certify that they meet certain facility health and safety standards.

The Health and Safety Requirements portion of the Child Care allocation was developed using each county's percent to total of the most recent quarters of expenditures (June 2000 through March 2001) for Self-Certification and Trustline.

An adjustment was made to assure that each county receives a minimum of \$1,000 for each component.

Attachment VII contains a listing of all program codes for the CalWORKs Single Allocation. The expenditures charged against these programs are tracked from the quarterly County Expense Claim.
