



# California Evidence-Based Clearinghouse for Child Welfare

## Online resource provides easy access to scientifically tested practices in child welfare

In January 2004, as part of the state's child welfare improvement strategies, the California Department of Social Services' Office of Child Abuse Prevention (OCAP) partnered with the [Chadwick Center for Children and Families](#) in cooperation with the [Child and Adolescent Services Research Center](#) to award a grant to create an evidence-based clearinghouse for child welfare practices in California. The current grant cycle began July of 2016 and will conclude June of 2019.

The [California Evidence-Based Clearinghouse](#) (CEBC) for Child Welfare is an online resource for child welfare professionals; researchers; policymakers; staff of public and private organizations and academic institutions; and others who are committed to improving outcomes for children and families. It is a key tool for identifying, selecting, and implementing evidence-based child welfare practices that will improve child safety, increase permanency, increase family and community stability, and promote child and family well-being. The average number of visitors per month between January and March of 2016 was 25,356.

The CEBC does all the homework - comprehensive scientific review of program literature, tools, methodology and evaluation - so child welfare professionals can focus their efforts on what they do best and apply their limited resources to most effectively meet community need. It provides simple, straightforward access to reviews and ratings of evidence-based practices relative to child welfare. The scientific rating scale is a 1 to 5 rating of the strength of the research evidence supporting a practice or program. The rating of 1 represents a practice with the strongest research evidence and a 5 represents a concerning practice that appears to pose substantial risk to children and families. The CEBC has been acknowledged both nationally and internationally as a vital resource for those who serve children and families.

The statewide clearinghouse is guided by two main bodies, which include representatives from the Office of Child Abuse Prevention:

- » A statewide Advisory Committee comprised of state and local child welfare leaders, supporting organizations, and nationally respected authorities on child welfare
- » A national Scientific Panel comprised of five core members who are nationally recognized as leaders in child welfare research and practice

Each year since its launch in June 2006 new topic areas have been added to the clearinghouse in the following categories: Anger Management, Domestic Violence, and Substance Abuse; Behavior Management including Parent Training; Core Child Welfare Services including Placement and Reunification; Engagement and Parent Partnering Programs; Mental Health; and Support Services for Youth in the Child Welfare System. As of April 1, 2016, there were a total of 340 evidence-based programs included on the CEBC.

In late 2016 the site was re-launched with new branding and a new look. In the new grant cycle, the CEBC will continue to update the new website which will integrate alternative methods and media, including creation of a YouTube channel and podcasts. The CEBC will also be creating a distance-based technical assistance plan in order to provide support to organizations asking for program implementation support via phone and email.
