SUBJECT: **FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION SAFETY NOTICE REGARDING
HAND SANITIZERS CONTAINING METHANOL**

Provider Information Notice (PIN) Summary

PIN 20-17-CCP provides an updated safety notice regarding hand sanitizers containing methanol.

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has recently released a [safety notice regarding hand sanitizers containing methanol](#). The FDA issued a warning to consumers, which includes child care providers, about hand sanitizer products that are labeled as containing ethanol (also known as ethyl alcohol) but that have tested positive for methanol contamination.

The FDA recommends consumers immediately stop using these hand sanitizers and dispose of the bottle in a hazardous waste container, if available, or dispose of as recommended by your local waste management and recycling center. Do not flush or pour these products down the drain or mix with other liquids.

Why is this dangerous?

Methanol (i.e., methyl alcohol or wood alcohol) is a substance that can be toxic when absorbed through the skin or ingested and can be life-threatening when ingested. The FDA has determined that methanol is not an acceptable active ingredient for hand sanitizers and must not be used due to its toxic effects. The FDA's investigation of methanol in certain hand sanitizers is ongoing, and updates will be posted to their website.

What precautions to take?

It is important to wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after going to the bathroom, before eating, after coughing, sneezing, or blowing one's nose.
