SUBJECT: ANNUAL FOOD STAMP PROGRAM (FSP) SURVEY OF OPERATIONS AND ACCESS

REFERENCE: Manual Sections 63-104.21 (h) and 63-205.1, All County Letter 94-11

The purpose of this letter is to request that all County Welfare Departments (CWDs) complete the Annual County FSP Survey of Operations and Access. As you are aware, state regulations require that all CWDs annually complete a survey and review of hours of operation of the FSP offices. This is to ensure that the needs of recipients are adequately met.

BACKGROUND

As with prior surveys conducted over the years, the information provided on the survey is useful to the California Department of Social Services (CDSS) in meeting statewide program needs. It allows CDSS to respond to information requests regarding the administration of the FSP by CWDs as well as evaluate legislative proposals and regulatory changes. Also, next year's outreach campaign will use the information compiled from the Access portion of the survey.

AUTOMATED SURVEY

This year the survey has been automated. In addition, the survey has been redesigned for administrative ease by including the most frequently cited responses from last year's survey. There is also an "other" category available for counties to use if an activity is not addressed by the available choices.

The survey is divided into three primary parts: A) Access and Awareness, B) Certification, and C) Issuance. Please be aware that these parts cover different time periods and information is to be reported accordingly. Part A should reflect activities conducted in State Fiscal Year (SFY) 03/04 and Parts B and C should

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reflect county operations as of June 30, 2004. These time periods are also defined in the survey itself.

After downloading the survey, information for completing and submitting the survey can be accessed by opening the survey file and clicking on the various "buttons" located at the top and left sides of the file. Once the survey has been completed, it is to be submitted electronically. Completion of the survey electronically will save time, improve accuracy through the use of validation features, and facilitate data compilation of survey results. Out-Stationing of Eligibility Workers:

Of the counties answering the survey, 67 percent reported that they had out-stationed workers. Counties indicated that workers were located in places such as: Hospitals, WIC, Local Crisis Center, health clinics, family resource centers, vocational training centers, Healthy Start centers, one-stop centers, homeless shelters, senior outreach sites, schools, Veteran's Administration Office, Air Force Base, rehab centers, probation offices, churches and migrant fairs. Some counties have mobile units.

Participation in Community Events:

Many counties, 78%, participate in: Health Fairs, Job Fairs, Harvest Festivals, Spring Carnivals at Schools, County Fairs, Community Resource Fairs, Migrant Fairs, Senior Programs, Veterans Stand Down and Faith-based events. (Besides Fairs and other community events the following counties also participate in other types of events)

- Alameda - WIC, Food Banks, clinics
- Butte - Provides information during emergency situations
- Calaveras - Job Connection and Salvation Army
- El Dorado - local school groups, Alcohol recovery programs, Rotary and Lions Clubs
- Fresno - Mariachi festivals, Food Bank events, events sponsored by Assembly member
- Kern - community collaborative, school districts
- Kings - healthy start sites, naval base
- Los Angeles - healthcare fairs, county expos, school fairs
- Mariposa - Women's information expo, senior functions
- Mendocino - Private Industry Council, schools and health, hunger and nutrition forum
- Monterey - community events (SCORE), Koffee Klatch provides information to Spanish speaking parents of local school district
- Nevada - Hispanic community groups, food bank
- Orange - Food banks, boys and girls clubs, schools, Asian gardens, fiesta Market Place, center for disabled, and Latino Town Hall
- Placer - WIC Outreach Nutritional (education) Program
- San Bernardino - homeless and women's shelters, schools and education/job support programs

Outreach Efforts – Best Practices

Of the Counties that responded many indicated that they had collaborative partnerships with other agencies such as WIC, food banks and CBOs. They also participated in community based functions where workers distribute FSP information and applications and answer questions and the out-stationing of workers were among their most important outreach activities: (The following is list of counties that participate in other types of outreach activities)

Butte County has expanded their Website and has a community resource brochure. They also have Medi-Cal eligibility staff trained to accept and process FS applications and customers also have access to FS information through the county One Stop(s) partners.

Calaveras - partnership with the Human Resource Council.

Colusa - "outreach is easy ... Our offices are small and friendly and clients seldom wait to see a worker. The informality eases communication with the client. The atmosphere is our most effective outreach."

El Dorado County stations eligibility workers in the community (remote site services).

Fresno County has a Mobile Intake unit that provides services to people in remote areas with little or no transportation.

Glenn County has after hours operations and because we are a One Stop we have many opportunities to reach the community.

Imperial County has seven Family Resource Centers located throughout the county.

Kern County spends time explaining the benefits of applying for FS during all client contacts at Department of Health Services offices and clinics. They also make personal contact with weavers of FS and Medi-Cal.

Los Angeles County has a Direct Certification Program, which is a partnership between the Department of Public Social Services (DPSS) and school districts in Los Angeles County. Annually, in June, DPSS provides a computer tape listing all approved CalWORKS and Food Stamp cases and a computer match is done by the participating school districts to match these cases with the students enrolled in their schools. When a match occurs, the student is automatically provided with free school lunches. The Los Angeles and Glendale School

Districts obtain the yearly tape from our Department and coordinate the match with participating school districts. Approximately 80% of the school districts in Los Angeles County currently participate in direct certification. LA County and the California Food Policy Advocates are continuing to expand the program to include school districts that are not currently taking advantage of direct certification in order to increase the number of eligible children approved to receive free school meals. DPSS also provides Food Stamp education/outreach materials to school districts and participates in a Mail-In Food Stamp Application Program with the Los Angeles Regional Food Bank, the Daughters of Charities Ministries, and the Asian Pacific Ventures Association and other community based organizations.

Marin County works with the Aging Department to encourage the elderly to apply.

Mariposa County sends a FS survey to clients each year - "the questions actually inform."

Orange County - "Collaboration with the County of orange Health Care Agency in their role as administrator of local California Nutrition Network funds."

Plumas County provides application at the hospitals and at their One Stop Center.

Sacramento County -- Collaborates with other organizations and programs; including outreach activities using VISTA workers for the Hunger Commission to distribute fliers at Senior Centers and other locations.

San Benito County uses local media; "especially the local Spanish radio station...Monthly we hold a "question and answer" hour on the air."

San Bernardino County makes services available outside of normal office hours. They also process applications and provide information at local elementary schools. "Providing good customer service that meets the client's needs."

Santa Clara County works with their Safety Net Committee which provides an opportunity for all agencies to work together to identify and meet the food needs of the community.

Sierra - Word of mouth.

Stanislaus County has a Media Campaign. The county also has a monthly news letter that is sent to TANF households.

Tulare County makes food stamp applications available at health clinics and local hospitals.

Ventura County most effective outreach activities have been Veterans' Stand Down, senior centers, Medi-Cal outstationed services.

Outreach Efforts - Future Plans:

Many counties have indicated that due to fiscal constraint many of the activities that they would like to do or have planned have been curtailed. However, many counties continue to plan to participate in community event and provide information to community and school groups. As EBT rolls out many counties are working to assist clients in the transition to EBT

Contra Costa County plans to provide FS training to volunteers at food and nutrition base CBO's.

Fresno County continues to target seniors.

Glenn County plans to continue working with Family Resource canthers for outreach.

Humboldt County is involved in a state-wide pilot project with WIG and is hoping to target senior in an awareness project.

Imperial County is planning on posting food stamp information posters at CBO's.

Kern County will continue to participate at local job fairs, and school open house. The county is also expanding FS application taken by new recipients of Medi-Cal and making the FS application available by FAX, FFY and email. The county is also working on outreach funding in schools through the Nation Health Services.

Los Angeles County sends eligibility workers from two district offices to non-traditional sites, such as food pantries and senior centers, to take applications. LA County has developed a nutritional guide for recipients that will be distributed the later part of 2003 through 2004. A link has been established from the County website to the USDA-FNS website so clients can use the new pre-screening tool. The Child Medi-Cal Enrollement Project eligibility workers will continue to offer families the opportunity to apply for Food Stamps. The Health & Nutrition Access Committee is continuing to identify barriers that prevent eligible households from participating in the Food Stamp Program and to develop solutions to eliminate these barriers. LA County also has a commitment to disseminate specially designed Food Stamp Nutrition Program educational materials via Community Based Organizations, health facilities, schools, libraries, churches, food pantries, grocery markets and neighborhood stores throughout Los Angeles County.

Marin County will continue to conduct nutrition surveys with clients in collaboration with public health nutritionists.

Mendocino County provides employers a presentation with a packet of information including brochures, fliers and referral forms for their employees.

Monterey County is finalizing procedures for Mail-In Food Stamp Application for use in collaboration with local CBOs. The county is also planning to distribute

brochures to all schools who wish to participate to be sent home with students with free and reduced price meal applications.

Sacramento County is looking into advertising the FSP on the bus and light rail system. The county provides applications and training to homeless providers.

San Bernardino County plans to continue to coordinate with WIC and is in the process of developing a project with a local CBO that received a OHS grant to promote nutrition/FS participation.

San Diego County plans to continue to make presentations at CBO's, schools, nutrition centers, elder centers, pre-schools. The county also plans to refer people to the FNS.USDA.GOV website and plans to develop a county FS website.

San Francisco County has a cross training program to maximize staffing resources. They are also planning outreach to the elderly, disabled, and homeless informing them about the Restaurant Meals Pilot Program. They are also planning outreach to immigrant community regard changes in immigrant legislation.

Santa Clara County is planning a six-month pilot project to take FS application at local food distribution sites. The county is currently constructing an internet website and is planning to install informational Kiosks in the lobbies of their Intake Offices. The county is also working with laid off airport screeners to provide them application assistance.

Santa Cruz - Health Care outreach and WIC.

Sonoma County is working to integrating the FS and Medi-Cal office.

Sutter County is planning on making monthly visits to the Women's Prison to provide FS program information.

Ventura County intends to collaborate with senior nutrition programs, foster care, veterans' services, public health and school districts in an effort to reach additional populations.

Yolo County is working to coordinate with the Federal Food Distribution Program to provide applications and information at rural distribution sites.
