SUBJECT: FEDERAL FISCAL YEAR (FFY) 2005 FOOD STAMP EMPLOYMENT

AND TRAINING (FSET) PROGRAM 15 PERCENT EXEMPTION

ALLOCATIONS FOR ABLE-BODIED ADULTS WITHOUT DEPENDENTS

(ABAWDS)

The purpose of this letter is to provide counties with the FFY 2005 allocation of the 15 percent exemptions from the ABAWD work requirement. ABAWDs can receive food stamps for only three months in a 36-month time period unless they work at least 20 hours a week or participate in an approved work or training program. The Balance Budget Act of 1997 allows States to exempt 15 percent of their ABAWD population from the three-month time limit for ABAWDs who are at risk of losing their food stamp benefits for not meeting the work requirement.

The effective date of the current allocations is retroactive to April 1, 2005 through September 30, 2005. California can exempt 44,712 ABAWDs monthy or a total of 268,272 from the work requirement. This amount includes the unused 15 percent exemptions that were carried over from FFY 2004.

Attachment 1 displays the county allocation of monthly ABAWD 15 percent exemptions for FFY 2005. The allotment of 15 percent ABAWD exemptions for each county is based on its share of the statewide non-assistance food stamp caseload for FFY 2004. Each county has the flexibility to determine the most efficient and effective manner to use its 15 percent exemptions. The county can vary the number of 15 percent exemptions utilized from month to month, as needed. For example, a county that receives an annual allocation of 1,200 exemptions may choose to spread them out evenly over the 12 months, reserve them for months in which high unemployment is expected or utilize a variation of the two methodologies to achieve maximum benefit for its ABAWD population.

To minimize the impact of ABAWDs losing their food stamp benefits, counties are encouraged to carefully manage and only utilize their allocated 15 percent exemptions for ABAWDs who may loose food stamp benefits. When a State over-utilizes the previous year's allotment, FNS will reduce the number of 15 percent exemptions for the next FFY.

And, when states under-utilize their allocation, the unused number of 15 percent exemptions is rolled-over to the following FFY.

As a reminder, Manual of Policies and Procedures (MPP) Sections 63-407.53 and 63-410.53 specify that when an individual receives a food stamp disqualification for voluntarily quitting a job or failing to comply with an FSET assignment, the individual may not re-establish eligibility until the disqualification ends or the individual qualifies for one of the food stamp work registration exemptions as specified in MPP Section 63-407.21. This means that a 15 percent ABAWD exemption cannot be granted until the disqualification ends.

Usage of the ABAWD 15 percent exemptions is reported monthly on line 3 of the Food Stamp Program Work Registrant, ABAWDs, and FSET Program Caseload Report, (STAT 47) form.
