- SUBJECT: IMPLEMENTATION OF A 10 PERCENT WAGE/BENEFITS PASS-THROUGH PROVISION FOR GROUP HOMES AND FOSTER FAMILY AGENCIES (FFA)
- **REFERENCE**: Assembly Bill (AB) 2876 (Chapter 108, Statutes of 2000) All County Letter (ACL) NO. 00-64

The purpose of this ACL is to provide information regarding the implementation of a 10 percent wage/benefits pass-through provision, which takes effect January 1, 2001. As a result of this provision, the schedule of rates for group homes and FFAs will be increased to reflect the addition of the supplemental payment. An overview of the provisions and the new rate schedules is provided below.

OVERVIEW OF PROVISIONS

AB 2876 (Chapter 108, Statutes of 2000) enacted a 10 percent wage/benefits pass-through provision for childcare workers and social workers in group homes effective January 1, 2001, through the addition of Welfare and Institutions Code (WIC) Section 11462(g)(3). The statute provides group home providers with the flexibility to use the supplemental payment in any of the following ways:

- Increase salaries; and/or
- Increase benefits; or
- Hire additional staff. •

AB 2876 also added WIC Section 11463(h) to incorporate a similar 10 percent pass-through provision for FFA social work staff only. Like the group home providers, FFA providers have the same flexibility with respect to how they utilize the supplemental payment.

GROUP HOMES

As previously indicated, AB 2876 provided a 10 percent supplemental payment increase to the amount included in the standard rate for each Rate Classification Level (RCL) for salaries, wages, and benefits of staff providing **child care and supervision** and/or performing **social work activities**. Because the 10 percent supplemental payment increase is applied to the amount included in the rate for the designated personnel, the actual overall rate percentage increase will vary for each RCL.

FOSTER FAMILY AGENCIES

AB 2876 also provided for a 10 percent supplemental payment increase to the component for **social work activities** in the AFDC-FC FFA treatment rates schedule. The following charts provide the rates that were effective July 1, 2000, and the new rates schedule including the supplemental payments that are effective January 1, 2001.

PROVIDER REQUIREMENTS

AB 2876 provided the California Department of Social Services with the authority to require all group home/FFA providers to certify that the supplemental payment increase will be used for its intended purpose. To ensure that the increased funds are utilized as intended by the legislature, the Department will require group home/FFA providers to complete a declaration form indicating how they intend to use the supplemental payment funds. Upon return and receipt of the signed certification form, the Department will issue the individual FY 2000/01 Rate Notification Letter reflecting the increase to the FFA/group home provider. Providers will be responsible for ensuring the funds are spent and documented appropriately.

Providers will receive additional information regarding requirements for the 10 percent wage/benefits pass-through provision in subsequent correspondence from the Department.

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COUNTY REQUIREMENTS

To ensure that the certification requirements have been met, counties must wait to receive a copy of the Rate Notification Letter from the FFA/group home provider before issuing the new rate, which includes the supplemental payment increase. However, the supplemental payment increase will be effective January 1, 2001, regardless of when the Rate Notification Letter is actually received. Counties are also responsible for using correct sharing ratios when claiming costs for reimbursement.
