TO: ALL COUNTY WELFARE DIRECTORS

SUBJECT: TREATMENT OF EDUCATIONAL GRANTS AND LOANS IN THE FOOD STAMP PROGRAM

This letter is to provide the county welfare departments (CWDs) with instructions to implement provisions of Public Law 99-498 which impact a portion of the emergency regulations which became effective February 1, 1987, (RDB# 1186-51) "Treatment of Certain Educational Grants and Loans".

Public Law 99-498 impacts the current provisions of the Food Stamp Act and federal regulations with regard to the treatment of federal grants received by individuals from programs funded under Title IV of the Higher Education Act. Current state and federal regulations limit the income exclusion to tuition and mandatory fees for federal grants and loans. The new Public Law now provides an additional income exclusion for the portion of federal grants and loans funded under Title IV which is intended for specified educational costs, including transportation, miscellaneous personal expenses, books and supplies.

Public Law 99-498 is considered by the Department of Education and the Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) Office of General Counsel as self-implementing, and is effective on the date the law was enacted which is October 17, 1986. As such, FNS has instructed the states not to wait for federal regulations. Therefore, effective April 1, 1987, CWDs must apply these new provisions for all new applications and, when they become aware of an affected case, or when a client requests a review of his/her case. These benefits should be restored back to October 17, 1986 where appropriate.

In order for the CWDs to determine the amount of the grant or loan that can be excluded, written verification of the financial aid award and educational expenses must first be obtained from the educational institution. The Financial Aid Office of the school which the student attends has a student budget which identifies these expenses and is used to calculate the amount of financial aid.

Upon receipt of the student budget, the CWDs should identify and total the amounts which are to be excluded, that is, tuition and mandatory fees, transportation, miscellaneous personal expenses, books and supplies. This total is then deducted from the total Title IV financial aid award(s). The remaining financial aid amount will be treated as income and prorated accordingly. The following are examples of how this would be done:

(A) \$2,700 = Total federal aid (Title IV of the Higher Education Act) as verified by the school.
